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# Message from Principal





Relationships were ruptured and many came to an abrupt end. Families were torn apart and separated; the grief and shock had taken its toll on the human heart and spirit. Our world was in mourning.

It is this same family and community spirit that our Founding Fathers made a deliberate choice to foster, nurture and strengthen here at Fatima College in 1945.

Sixty years later, we are faced with a collapse of a family and community spirit in our country and our world. # A Message from Fr. Gregory

The Guardian's headline of Saturday May 14, 2005 read "Ghost School" referring to a school in Arima at which only 50% of the student population turned out the previous day. In that very week the Minister of Education referred to student arsonists. These are haunting signs of our times; it is certainly not the full story of education in our country but a story that calls us to reflect.

Fatima College celebrates its Jubilee Year and we too are reflecting on our history and our roots. Jubilee is a time of stock-taking. What then have the present concerns to do with us? Are we shielded or more privileged? Is the Fatima

boy of a different stock from others? I think not. We are all cut from the same fabric of this nation; we must take account of our sacred responsibilities to our brothers and sisters particularly the very young, the aged and the most vulnerable. We must ensure that the minds and hearts of our young people are molded in a fashion that makes them critically aware of the challenges of our time and their Christian responsibility of compassion and social action.

The Founding Fathers responded to the call in a time of great transition 1944 - 45 which marked the end of the Second World War. There was an increased demand for secondary education. The fathers said a clear yes to this need. We too, sixty years later, must say a clear yes to the demands of our time. Our faith tells us that the crises that we face will indeed be overcome, for by striving we will conquer.

# Our Lady of Fatima College

The Beginning Fr. Andrew Cockburn, C.S.Sp

After many meetings and correspondence, and disagreeing and agreeing and frustrations - with the Archbishop Ryan, Dr. Meenan, Principal of C.I.C. Fr. J. Byrne, CSSp, Fr. Flavin, O.P., P.P. of St. Theresa's Parish, and the CSSp Generalate in Paris, it was finally agreed that the Holy Ghost Fathers would be entrusted with the direction of the New Secondary School in the Woodbrook - Mucurapo area.

In deference to the Archbishop who had a great devotion to Our Lady of Fatima, it was to be called "Our Lady of Fatima College."


The new College opened on Monday 29th January 1945 in temporary quarters at St. Theresa's. It was a small two-room building with a partition dividing the two classrooms. There were 2 classes of 30 boys each. The staff was Fr. J. Byrne, CSSp, and Principal, who spent most of his days at the new building site on Mucurapo Road. He took the last class in the day.

The other members of staff - two in number - were Michael Mc Carthy, an Irish Holy Ghost Seminarian, and Andrew Cockburn - the first lay Teacher of the School.

It was on Monday 10th September, 1945 that Fr. Byrne transferred his boys to the New College where two classrooms were occupied. I had just completed my studies at St. Mary's and the Superior of the Holy Ghost Fathers, Dr. Meenan, Principal of C.I.C., asked me to teach at the New School. This was January 1945.

World War II was still in progress - it ended in the latter part of 1945. Things were very hard and almost everything was in short supply or could not be gotten at all.

The first batch of boys numbered 60. Thirty in a classroom. The two of us teachers, Mc Carthy and myself switched classrooms during the day at the end of each period of class. We taught all



There was a very good spirit among the students and staff. It was like one big family. I can still remember the names of most of those pioneers. Many of those were - *BRILLIANT*. We had no playing field, but we did have games, for we had the equipment. This was in a small space in the Savannah. There was no television or video or DVD in those days, but Fr. Byrne did get a loan of a film projector and showed us films on Friday nights. I remember distinctly walking or sometimes cycling from our home on Phillips Street on the Eastern side of the Cemetery with a load of exercise books duly corrected, to the Fatima College temporary site on Petra Street. The war was still on.

Towards the end of 1945 I was to leave Trinidad for Canada to join the Holy Ghost Fathers.


It was on 14th October that the Archbishop formally blessed the new School - "Our Lady of Fatima College."

The "mustard seed" was sown. And it was to flourish to what it is today.

Ryan (the "Raj"), all those splendid priest and prefects who taught at Fatima along with some great lay teachers such as Mr. Carlton Craigwell (later to be principal at Belmont Intermediate) and Mr. Van Stewart (later to be Principal of QRC).

Our great motto "Nitendo Vinces" and our school song ideally give the story of Fatima College.



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
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# HISTORY OF FATIMA COLLEGE

Fatima College is a seven year, male, Government-Assisted Secondary School. Fatima's tradition and culture encourages a family spirit amongst its staff members, students and parents. It is this spirit that allows Fatima College to boast of being one of the best Educational Institutions in the country.

Its staff is hard-working and dedicated to producing young men with an all-round education.



The College of Our Lady of Fatima began under very humble circumstances on the compound of St. Theresa's Intermediate School on January 1st, 1945. The pioneering members of staff were Fr. John Byrne, Michael Mc Carthy (prefect) and Mr. Andy Cockburn, layman now a priest.

The association with St. Theresa's began with parish Priest Fr. Francis Flavin, O.P., who first recognized the need for an additional Catholic College in North Trinidad. His immense foresight led to the establishment of this great educational institution.

Work on the present site began in February under the astute supervision of Fr. Byrne. He even recruited labour from the islands as many locals toiled for the Yankee dollar. In September, classes shifted from St. Theresa and on December 1st, Archbishop Ryan formally blessed and opened this new College dedicated to our Lady of Fatima. The College was designed to create an atmosphere of intimacy and community.

Fr. Byrne retired in 1955 after overseeing the building of the eastern and western wings, the diversion of the Maraval River to accommodate the Assembly hall, the construction of the chapel and three classrooms.

Fr. James Ryan succeeded him and developed the academic structures

and systems of the College. Quietly and efficiently, he guided Fatima through the fifties and sixties when a new government came into power with revolutionary plans for education.

In the sixties, Fatima got its own uniform, held its own sports meeting, defeated C.I.C. to win its first Inter Col final in 1965 with the inspirational Gally Cummings and launched its own Old Boys Union. Fr. Girod joined Fatima in 1965, took charge of the Scouts and organized the first Mayfair in 1966. Fatima College had come of age.

The seventies witnessed many social changes in the country. Fatima led the way with the almost inevitable transfer from clerical to lay control with the appointment of Clive Pantin as principal in 1972. Fr. Farfan, local Holy Ghost Father, was appointed Vice Principal, and these two dynamic individuals directed Fatima through the seventies with many novel changes. The production of a well-rounded individual dominated Fatima's philosophy.

The period was characterized by the building of the Audio-Visual Centre, Library, New classrooms, Cafeteria, Workshops and curriculum and class changes. Streaming was abandoned in the lower forms and students were now placed in alphabetical order. The concept of free choice of subjects was introduced from Form four. The curriculum was diversified to include Art, Physical Education, Industrial Art,

Technical Drawing, Accounts and Commerce.

Daphne Heywood and Jeanette Zakour joined the staff in 1973, heralding the entrance of women in a male dominated institution. Fatima won Inter Col for the second time in 1979 whilst Eugene Joseph and Roger Hernandez became our first Island scholars in 1976. Fatima was now definitely ranked as one of the leading institutions in the country, a model of academic and sporting prowess, catering for the needs of every pupil.

Clive Pantin retired in 1981, having served Fatima as Dean, Senior Dean, Senior Lay Master, Cricket and Football Coach, Vice Principal and Principal. He was succeeded by Mervyn Moore who had joined the staff in 1959. He recognized the worth of his staff and allowed them the freedom to use their initiative. Just about every individual was assigned some responsibility and brought into the organizational structure at the school.

At the function to welcome him as new Principal, Mr. Moore declared his priorities – the Catholic identity of the school, the rise in academic standards, the fostering of the family spirit and the continued production of well-rounded individuals.

A Monday assembly was started to set the right tone for the week. A streamed class was introduced in Form three as it was felt that Fatima



did not adequately encourage the more gifted pupils to excel. Music was introduced to the curriculum with the arrival of Myrtle Cumberbatch. Fatima published its first Annual in 1982, Kieron James won the President's medal in the same year, a first for Fatima. Kyle Rudden repeated the feat in 1984.

In 1984, thanks to Republic Bank, the Computer Lab was officially opened under the direction of Fr. De Four. In 1988, the New Science Wing was constructed, the Library extended and a new classroom built. This was funded by Robert Amar in memory of his father, Bolan Amar, founder of the Amar Group of Companies.

In the eighties and nineties, the lay teachers got more involved in the teaching of religion with the departure of many priests who has served Fatima faithfully throughout the years. A lay person, Anne Gomes – Phillips, assumed responsibility for the religion department and has been doing an excellent job of developing the Catholic character of the school.

The nineties saw the addition of two new faces to the administration of the school – Bernard Tappin as Vice Principal in 1991 and Fr. Gregory Augustine, Fatima product, as Manager in 1992. The dress uniform was reintroduced in 1995 to coincide with our fiftieth Anniversary celebrations. The Support Group Fatima and Friends 2000 was formed to give way to a more broad based parent Support Group a few years later.

Our football fortunes have declined over the years to the dismay of our loyal supporters. However we are now a force in Rugby, Basketball and Athletics. Table tennis has been revived, there is a renewed interest in Hockey and our Cricket teams have performed very well. We glory in the exploits of Ato Boldon and Brian Lara. Fatima boys are now excelling in a wide range of activities - Chess, Scrabble, Math Olympiad, Public Speaking, Essay Writing Competitions, Poetry, Model United Nations, Junior Soca Monarch, RBTT Young Leaders and Swimming. Our choir is a source of pride whilst our Form six boys undertake social projects with the Credo Centre and the Princess Elizabeth Home. Our Scout Troop is on its way to be ranked once more amongst the best in country.

The leadership mantle has been handed over to Mr. Anthony Garcia. He is working very closely with Vice Principal, Mrs. Anne Gomes –


Phillips and the Manager Fr. Gregory Augustine in the shaping of Fatima's future. They have inherited a highly professional staff, very committed to Fatima. They have sought to build on Fatima's strength and improve on any areas of weaknesses.

Plans for the future involve the enhancement and expansion of the physical facilities and increase of Form six intake. These are costly ventures requiring time, effort and proper planning. Our Mayfair this year was a tremendous success and this has to remain our main fundraising activity, bringing together the entire Fatima family, past and present. The Mayfair demonstrated the heights Fatima can achieve with all working towards a common goal. This is the spirit needed to drive the College if we have to undertake expansion works.

Fatima's future is indeed very bright. All the ingredients are there for Fatima to remain a foremost educational institution – solid foundation, visionary leadership, committed staff, meaningful structures, supportive parents and Old Boys, rich culture and traditions and most of all, the spiritual at the core of all our activities.

### FROM MR. MOORE

Positions are sometimes thrust upon us and so it was with me. I was called in during the summer holidays of 1981 and I was certain that it concerned the time table on which I was working. To my astonishment I was informed by Mr. Pantin of his decision to leave and of my impending position and duty. It was something I had not anticipated and yet the post carried dignity and responsibility, an honour and privilege that few achieve, making it thus desirable.



It was in 1982, the end of the first year of my term of office when celebrating a very successful year that I realized and stated that in all these successes "we must be mindful of those who sow the seeds and not only of the harvests." For it was during the 80's that we won the president's medal through Kieron James in 1982 and Kyle Rudden in 1984. In 1982 we won seven government scholarships, very memorable and joyful. We were bursting with pride.

But all was not plain sailing, percentage passes in both the Ordinary levels and Advanced levels were now going down. At 42.6% in the A levels in 1981 and bordering 50% at the O' levels. How encouraging it was to see that for the Advanced level part of the 80's we had progressed to 80% and continuing into the 90's brought 90% plus. While we were always in the hunt and always winning scholarships it must be recalled that the

government in 1997 were offering 60 scholarships of which we won five. From 1981 to 1999 we achieved 75 government scholarships an average of 4 per year.

On the playing field young Lara was blossoming. In 1984/85 he was playing both at the Under 16 and Championship levels and amassed a total of 1,319 runs with 807 (with

5 centuries) in the lower division. It is the memory of such dedication and performances that illuminate the years. David Carew scoring 123 in the Under 16 and taking 49 wickets was selected to represent the country in the Quadrangular Cricket Youth Series in Guyana. Further illumination – we made a clean sweep of all titles in this division, our semis team in hockey won the league, Intercol and indoor titles and we were champions in the inter school swimming competition for the 1985/86 year.

Such records were part and parcel of our year, sometimes exceptional and sometimes touched with mediocrity. But what kept us alive was the spirit – "we go beat them next year", our cry after so many intercols. We asked ourselves where did this spirit come from? Who were the sources? Teachers like Mr. H. Ramdass whose name comes first to mind and Mr. Kenny Roberts, Mr. Colin Murray, Mr. T. Fernandes, Mr. McNish (badminton) and of course principals Fr. Ryan and Mr. Pantin. There are many others - A. Piper and Larry Williams, Fr. Farfan (who built the pavilion), Ronald Daniel, Carew and Paty in more recent times, the past students who during school time every Tuesday at 5:00 pm and the names can go on and on. It was the work of everyone, for everyone who was favoured with a touch, a slice, a piece of this school seems forever bound by and bonded to it. We thank our Blessed Mother that she has in her own special way made this possible. We pray that we will continue to plant and to reap.




is disciplining them. She appreciates the staff as they have created a hospitable environment for her and are very supportive.

Dame Club. Coming from a staunch



In 1989, the French Government

awarded him the 'Palmes

Academiques' for his contribution to the teaching of French language and culture.







# RUGBY



houses with their







2005.





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
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# SEVEN YEARS OF FATIMA - A STUDENT'S VIEW

When I was younger I remembered driving past Fatima College and thinking to myself "I don't want to go to that school and become fat." The primary school days were enjoyable but secondary school was an experience.

I remembered entering Form one young and naive, which may or may not have been a good thing. I experienced problems adjusting to secondary school life and the people. Life was no longer just the pond of primary school; it had evolved into a vast sea. Form one was a period of adjustment for everybody including myself. I was appointed the editor of the Fatima newsletter to occupy my time and to improve my social skills.

By the start of Form two I had become accustomed to the change and my class. Students already knew what buttons to push on which teachers to have some excitement. By Form three the pace began to accelerate and it continued. At the end of Form three I picked the subjects that I enjoyed.

By far, the most enjoyable years during my tenure at Fatima were in Forms four and five. There was an enormous amount of freedom and responsibility, which is what made it enjoyable. The time however flew by, I still think I entered Form four two months ago.

The whole Fatima experience has been fulfilling with euphoric highs and manic lows. The entire class of 2005 seems to have aged with the school and the teachers some faster than others. In retrospect, my views on life, school and family have undergone dramatic change from Form one to the present because of this school.

Fatima College is not just the name of the school we attend and teach in, it encompasses much more. It is the unique learning and teaching atmosphere, not just about education but also about life. It is a standard of education, a place to mature, an opportunity and a gift that keeps on giving long after you leave.

# Amraj Seemungal

 $\mathbf{W}$ ith a 13 year history at Fatima, Amraj Seemungal is one of the most hard working and dedicated members of staff within our College's community. He came here as an assistant teacher III and though there were initial adjustment problems, he worked diligently and was placed in charge of printing of exams and made detention



master. He initially taught Geography to Forms 1-5. He also taught English to Form one which is guite shocking because as most of us Form sixes would know, sir is alphabetically challenged.

In 1995 he left Fatima on a government scholarship to pursue a Bachelor Degree in Geography at UWI's Mona campus. He returned in 1998 and was appointed Dean of Form Six in September 2002. Under his guidance Fatima has continued its tradition of winning A' level scholarships and Form sixes have excelled academically. They also have the best discipline records in the school. To most lower school students, Mr. Seemungal is feared, but as I myself can testify, "D' Bos" as he is called by sixth formers can be quite fair and reasonable in his judgment.

For the past two years he has been exclusively teaching A' level Geography. His pass rate is almost a hundred percent and it is in this area that he really pushes his students. From experience I can tell of geography class being about all work. No matter how well one does, sir would lament that there was still room for improvement. He does more work than any of his students and has very high expectations for his class. It is because of actions like these that two years ago, Alexander Paddinton was able to place 2nd in the world in A' level Geography. An achievement Mr. Seemungal views as the greatest moment in his career thus far.

Mr. Seemungal has an excellent attendance and punctuality record (probably bettered only by Mr. Ramdass). He claims that his greatest challenge is to form a balance between students, teachers and parents and blames this (not old age) for his increasing number of grey hair. With a aim of achieving 100% passes at A' level and a minimum of 15 scholarships in one year, it is clear that Mr. Seemungal has very high goals but by performing his duties justly and fairly he believes success would be achieved by creating a rewarding experience for both himself and for the students.

Always quick to talk about his rough past and explain to students how fortunate they are to be given an opportunity, Mr. Seemungal is a very inspirational person that most students view not only as a teacher or Dean but also a friend.






## Mr. Michael Maraj HEAD OF BUSINESS






### **Teachers Luncheon**

# ${ m f H}$ ow long have you been teaching at Fatima?

"Since 1979, 26 years ago"

### Before coming to Fatima, what did you do?

"After leaving Holy Name Convent with A levels, I taught at Mucurapo Girls RC for 3 years, then I left and went to UWI Mona, Jamaica to study Geography. After graduating, I taught at Tranquility for 1 year, then came to Fatima. I have never really done anything else, but I taught for my entire working life!"

### What inspired you to teach?

"As a little girl, (no, I wasn't born big), I played dolly house - I was the teacher and my dolls were the pupils. I guess I always knew that I wanted to work with young people, to help guide and mold their lives, to influence them positively."

### Is there anything special about Fatima?

"Yes . . . everything.

- 1. The family "environment" after 26 years, this too is my home it plays an important part in my life, considering I spent over half of my working hours here. It has matured me into the person I am today.
- 2. The teachers their dedication and commitment and love for this school their willingness to go the extra mile, beyond the call of duty, without being asked for love of Fatima. As students, you may not see this, but I know what happens behind the scene!!
- 3. When past students return to visit to show their progress and success with us, and when they join the Old Boys

Association, wanting to give back to their alma mater - I know that Fatima is special and has done excellent foundation work."

### What do you like about the students?

"The innocence and naivety of the Form 1's – watching them grow from this stage, through the restless puberty

(and backchat) years, to the point where they are mature and focused, ready to leave school.

I can talk and reason with Fatima boys, especially on a one to one basis. Most of them understand and respond positively. Even if they don't behave, what can I say; I know they eventually will - when they get older!!! I know this because they come back and tell me.!!!"

### What do you like about your colleagues?

"Their support and generosity. They are always there for me in m professional and personal life. I have built up many solid friendships that have weathered the passage of time, through good times and bad."

### What are the negatives about Fatima?

"It never ceases to amaze me how students can sit in a filthy classroom with food and paper spewed all around. How can you concentrate and perform in such a vile, unhealthy environment. I dislike seeing students in sloppy uniforms, like having their shirt out of their pants and at the same time, wrinkled too. It tells me that these guys have no pride in their appearance, and no respect for their school."

# Myself and Changes By: Nordric Hinds

September 7, 2004 changed my life. Hurricane Ivan struck the beautiful island of Grenada – my home and place of birth. In less than fourteen hours the island was left like an abandoned ship. 
## Nicholas Tin – Han Li (Form 1 – 3)

### Nicholas Koon Koon (Form 1 – 3)


Nicholas was born in Canada of Trinidadian parents and spent the first nine years of his life abroad. When







Fr. Michael de Verteuil was the homilist and reminded us of that special love, devotion and dedication that John Paul II demonstrated towards the youth during his papacy.




of the card game, "All Fours", as a computer science project at Harvard University where he has taken up his scholarship.

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
