Cape Is An Easy Exam And Other Things Ethan Wyke

When I was asked to write this article, I immediately jumped at the idea, not because I wanted write an inspirational piece. Actually, I can guarantee you nothing in this essay are inspirational. Therefore, I write this article to get a few qualms about CAPE, Form 6 and other related things off my chest, partly out of University level pretentiousness and partly out of frustration at this list of things that irk me about Fatima College, its Form 6 students and the whole CAPE exam in general.

At present, the government is giving its Secondary School students hundreds of thousands of dollars as incentive for students to study their work at C.A.P.E (Caribbean Advanced Proficiency Exam)! In doing so if, a person studies assiduously enough to obtain an additional scholarship, they will be given funds to study at any UWI campus as well as living expenses of roughly 2500 dollars monthly. The additional school also covers the costs of perusing medicine at St. George's in Grenada. Furthermore, if a person were to attain an open scholarship, they would have access to funds to study at any university in the world! For instance studying at the Royal college of Surgeons in Ireland costs a quarter million every year for the 1st three years and a subsequent half a million for each of the last two years. That accumulates to over 2 million dollars when the living expenses are taken into consideration. All of which will be given simply for excelling in C.A.P.E (which you need to do anyways to get into a top university.) If the seemingly endless money isn't an incentive, you are almost guaranteed a job to give back to the country when you return. This is coupled with the prestige of writing that you obtained a national scholarship, on your resume and applications, which universities view as a positive attribute when considering admissions.



It was my birthday. I turned 17 in May 2011, and though I didn't really feel different it was the minimum age requirement for one to be able to donate blood. The blood drive at my school, Fatima College, was on for sixth formers and teachers, but when granny said "is ah good ting to do yuh know Brandon" I thought it was right to listen to granny today. My dean and my English teacher were very concerned, me being so young and everything, but I assured that I'd be ok (though I wasn't to certain myself).

All in all, the thought of giving blood was very frightening. I kept thinking about a huge needle piercing my skin and sucking the blood out of my vein. Yeah I was having second thoughts but when I walked into the school's Audio Visual room and saw it transformed into a mini-hospital with all the necessary equipment and seemingly motherly personnel, all second thoughts vanished. I had to do this and I wanted to. I saw my teachers go before me and if they could do it then so could I. It hardly looked painful at all. This first nurse performed a routine physical exam, taking my Blood Pressure, Weight and the Iron level of my blood. The Iron count required a drop of blood and this is where I met Mr. Needle for the first time. I was also asked a series of medical and lifestyle questions (Sexually related and this I tried to answer without "cracking-up") and then I was told to get myself ready for a Pint of Blood. The nurse carried out this procedure, Nurse Evone, tried to make me less nervous and I sucked my fear in and put on a brave face. I sat on the hospital bed and though she told me I could look away I wanted to see. I wasn't prepared to see and welcome a 3" needle stick my vein and witness my blood pouring into the blood bag. I was not prepared to feel the stick and pinch of the needle or the queasiness in my stomach and in my

On May 5, 2011 the Minister of Health Therese Baptiste-Corne visited Fatima College. On Wednesday, she attended a blood donation exercise by students of Fatima College at the Audio Visual Room, Fatima College Grounds, Mucurapo Road, Port of Spain. As most persons are aware, there is currently a shortage of blood at the public health care system in Trinidad and Tobago. It stems from the abolishment of the "Chit system." Health Minister Therese Baptiste-Cornelis said the Government wanted to discontinue the chit system because "there was a lot of illegal sale of blood chits for as much as \$1,500 a pint, there was the sale of bogus chits and a large portion of the blood collected was found to be unsuitable." She added that the chit system was "not in keeping with WHO (World Health Organisation) standards."



Fatima enters Design-build Bridge Competition

On the Jan 15th 2011, the 3rd annual Secondary School's Bridge Building competition was held. In 2010, a competition was held for young writers in Trinidad and Tobago ages 12-19. It was set up by a not-for-profit organization that registered just a year earlier, called the Allen Prize for Young Writers, and as the name indicates, this organization is absolutely dedicated to seeking the interests of the youth in our twin-isle nation who share a deep and profound interest in the arts of creative writing.

As the first competition of its kind in our country, it was a riveting and heartwarming experience to be amongst the first generation of Trinidadian youth to have such an amazing and endearing opportunity. The competition ran from September to December, giving applicants four months to prepare a body of work that was substantial enough to stand a chance of publication.

There were two grouping of young writers: Juniors ages 12-15, and seniors ages 16-19, and within each group, there were four categories in order to satisfy every field of writing: Fiction, Creative Non-Fiction, Poetry and Drama. After the submissions came to close on December 31st 2010, four months of anxious and restless waiting proceeded until finally, the short list of writers was released

during the Easter Vacation of 2011. This list was extensive in length, and indicated how close the competition was as numerous writers were selected for the prizes.

In this competition, there was not only one winner, but several winners with prizes being awarded for excellence in every category. The inaugural awards ceremony took place on May 14th at a private residence in Maraval, to which all short listed writers were invited in order to witness the distribution of prizes. The panel of judges

consisted of some of our role models as young writers, including Sharon Millar, Kevin Baldeosingh, Debbie Jacob, Roslyn Carrington, Justice James Aboud and head judge, Judy Raymond.

In the Junior group, the prize for Fiction was awarded to a fellow student of Fatima College, Krystoff Kissoon of Form 5, as well as the grand prize of Junior Young Writer of the Year. In the Senior Category, Annabelle Castagne of our sister school, Holy Name Convent, who is also in Form 5, took home the senior prize for Fiction as well as the grand prize of Senior Young Writer of the Year.

In addition to the titles were cash prizes. Overall, the Allen Prize for Young Writers' first competition was deemed extremely successful in fulfilling its mission of giving young writers the opportunity to be awarded for their creative excellence, and the chance to develop and evolve their skills in writing through an intensive, two-day workshop

held for the winners of the prize in July.

Many may perceive Creative Writing as the tedious and monotonous work they are forced to do in English class, and hence out of sheer ignorance, miss out on the incredible journeys that writing can take you. The mind of a youth is a fascinating machine that is always filled with thoughts, ideas, emotions and inspirations. We are enthused and stimulated by almost anything and everything we experience, and while the mind is still so very unpretentious and unselfconscious, we as youths must rise to the occasion and make full use of our natural, instinctive creative abilities to produce work that defies our wildest dreams. So I implore you, open your eyes and open your hearts to the thrills of writing, and not solely for

the sake of awards nor competitions although they may be highly rewarding for writers in general, but for the sake that in such a discipline you may discover revelations about yourself that you didn't even know existed. 

ATHLETICS

At the end of last season (September 2009 to July 2010) I wrote, "this year was another outstanding year for Fatima College Athletics. Our athletes continued to display talent, dedication and determination". This season all I can say is WOW! WHAT A SEASON THIS HAS BEEN!! And we still have another three months to go! The Fatima College Athletics Team has truly headed in the right direction under the guidance and protection of Our Blessed Mother, Mary, whose intercession has borne much fruit and we are extremely grateful. Here is a very brief summary of events over the past nine (9) months.

14th November, 2010. Brendan Hatch, Antonio Achee, William Alexander, Scott Ifill and Kevin Hannays accepted the invitation from Mayaro Secondary School to participate in its 1st 5k Relay held in Mayaro. Our FATIMA boys performed very well and established themselves as a force to be reckoned with. This group set the tone for the rest of the competitive season.

28th November 2010. At the National Amateur Athletic Association (NAAA) cross country meet in Couva, fourteen of our boys participated in the boys under-15 division emerging the champion boys school. This was the first of several titles

Fatima has claimed this season and was also the first time we have ever participated in the NAAA cross country event.

15th January, 2011. Next up was the Secondary Schools 5K Championship in Toco. Here, 11 of our talented athletes (from forms 1 to 6) endured the long trek to and from Toco, placing fourth (4th) out of the colleges present and eighth (8th) out of the eighteen (18) boys schools.

10th February, 2011. Fatima College emerged as the champion team at the National Secondary Schools Relay Festival in the under-20 4x400m event (Breon Mullings, William Alexander, Mikheil Caraby, Ché Carr) and the







under-15 4x100m race (Graeme Felix, Xavier Mulugata, Jonathan Cassimire, Nkosi Craigwell-Walkes) The full team of 48 placed fourth (4th) out of all secondary schools in Trinidad and Tobago and second (2nd) in the colleges category.


17th and 18th February, 2011. The Port of Spain and Environs Championships followed a week after Relay Fest with our boys putting their best foot forward, winning in several categories, in spite of a short break between events. March to Mid April. In this period we participated in the Belmont Boys' 5k, Southern Games Heats, the Carifta trials, and the Falcon Games in Tobago.

29th and 30th April. Our Lady of Fatima College participated for the first time in the premiere high school athletics event, The Penn Relays, in the USA. This historic event saw Fatima challenging schools from all over the world in the 4x100m and 4x400m races. The results for a first time school have exceeded all expectations. In the shorter sprint, our team of Trey Hart, Abraham Bowen, Alexander Prevatt, and Breon Mullings impressed several local coaches by clocking a time of 43.71 and placing second in our heat (38th out of 266 schools). We are very proud of these young men who, together with reserves Mikel Worrell and Xavier Mulugata, were more than excellent ambassadors for Fatima College and Trinidad and Tobago on and off the track.

Upcoming events include the NAAA Juvenile and Junior Championships, as well as the Morvant Jets Games, and NAAA National Track and Field Championships. The season ending meet will be the Zenith Relays in Tobago in July.

The choir also performed at another fundraiser at Holy Name Convent, Port of Spain, where they sang "We Come From Fatima",



While hockey is not a mainstream sport in Trinidad and Tobago, changes had to be made to the standard 11 side teams in competitions in order to facilitate the continuity of the sport in Secondary Schools. Fatima has adapted well, and our boys unceasingly strive on for excellence. Case in point is Fatima's Under 15 hockey team who was crowned 1st during the last Sept-November Indoor season. None other that Fatima's very own: Jordan Vieira was awarded the title of MVP as well as Most Goals scored. Our Under 20 hockey team placed 2nd last season. Special mention must be made of Andrew Vieira and Ryan Daniel who helped steer us to our victory! Our hockey teams were also at the Outdoor arena, as our Under-20 side placed 3rd for the competition spanning Jan-Apr 2010.

Let's not forget the remarkable achievements of Andrew Vieira. At age 16, August 2010 Pan American Indoor qualifiers in Caracus, Venezuela, scoring vs Argentina. He then went to Holland on trials, although he didn't make the final cut, it was great even to be considered. Andrew was also a regular member on the U21 National Team, representing his country at the C.A.C. Games. Evidently, Fatima's hockey team remains a force to be reckoned with.

Fatima college library is run by Ms. Warrick, who is assisted by N.A.L.I.S. employees and library prefects. The library in the college provides a wide range of services to students including photocopies, stationary sales and book loans on both fictional and informative books. Once per term, the library prefects are also charged with creating a display based on current regional or global events, religious or cultural holidays or famous people.

The library has recently begun to embrace technological change. Recently, the Ministry Of Education presented the library with 8 new computers. This allows students who visit the library to now have access to the internet. There has also been the addition of ebscoHOST access which contains several papers and articles which may be of interest to students writing the Caribbean Secondary Education Certificate or Caribbean Advanced Proficiency Exams papers in May-June of every year. The library has also begun work on renovations and upgrades which will enable it to better serve the student body of Fatima College.

Every year nearly 30 students apply for spots in the team of library prefects. Of them, usually 6-8 are chosen. Only students in Form 4 are allowed to apply. However, exceptions are sometimes made for form 3 students who apply directly to the head librarian. The students are then asked a series of 5 questions followed by a random scenario question. Based on this suitability, the candidates are chosen. These candidates are then put on probation for a month to ensure that they are the right choices. Those chosen are then assigned their duty days. They will be required to work for the library on two break times and one lunch time per week.

The International Mathematical Olympiad (IMO) is an annual World Championship Mathematics Competition for Secondary School students. Our country's first entry was in 1991 and Fatima College enters each year in the hope that our students excel, and are then selected to represent the country in the International competition.

Near the commencement of each academic year, the Trinidad & Tobago Math Olympiad organizes a preliminary Round 1, from Australian Mathematics Trust competition for students in secondary schools. Round 2 is an exponentially more intense examination as students are required to answer four mind-probing questions in about 3 hours. The results are declared in February and the TTMO selects approximately twenty students who will be trained at UWI. Fatima College has done exceptionally well, especially since we have edged hundreds of other students who come from schools with teachers dedicated to training students for the competition. In recent years, students have placed in the top 10 in the country as well as numerous students obtaining certificates of distinctions!








SKATEBOARDING


SWIMMING


