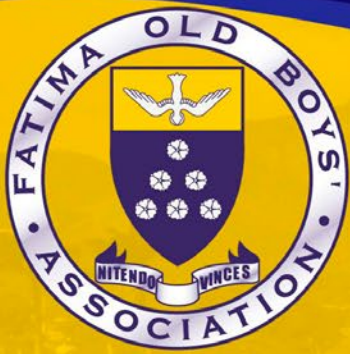

Living the Grey Shirt – Dr. Kern Guppy

(2024 Fatima College Hall of Achievement Inductee)

Dr. Kern Hayden Guppy is a distinguished Neurosurgeon, Engineer, and Academic whose career spans over 25 years in medicine and more than a decade in Engineering. A proud alumnus of Fatima College, Class of 1972.

Dr. Guppy's academic journey began with an AMOCO scholarship to pursue a Bachelor's degree in Petroleum Engineering at the University of Tulsa. He later earned a Master's and PhD in Petroleum Engineering, along with a Master's in Industrial Engineering, from Stanford University, where he also served as a Teaching Assistant and Sigma Xi Science Honor Society member.

Dr. Guppy began his professional career as an Assistant Professor of Petroleum Engineering at the University of Southern California, where he collaborated on blood flow dynamics modeling with the medical school, igniting his interest in Medicine. This passion led him to Northwestern University, where he obtained his MD, followed by a residency in Neurosurgery and a fellowship in Complex Spine Surgery.

Currently, Dr. Guppy is the Chief of Neurosurgery Spine at Kaiser Permanente Medical Group in Sacramento, California, and the Co-Lead of the Kaiser Permanente National Spine Registry. He also serves as Clinical Associate Professor of Neurosurgery at the University of California, San Francisco, and the University of California, Davis, where he is the off-site Director of the Residency Program in Neurosurgery. His practice focuses on complex spine surgery and brain tumors, earning him recognition as a leader in the field.

A prolific researcher, Dr. Guppy has published over 65 peer-reviewed articles and holds numerous leadership positions in prestigious professional organizations, including past-Presidency of the San Francisco Neurological Society. Among his accolades, he received the 2022 Morris F. Collen Research Award for extraordinary accomplishments as a clinician-researcher, and multiple awards for his clinical research.

Dr. Guppy maintains strong ties to Stanford University, serving on its Alumni Association Board of Directors and participating in the Stanford Alumni Mentoring Programme. In 2024, he achieved another milestone by earning a Master's in Public Health from Harvard University.

Dr. Kern Guppy's exemplary career, bridging Engineering and Medicine, reflects his unwavering dedication to innovation, education, and patient-care, making him a most deserving inductee into the Fatima Hall of Achievement 2024.

Q Why did you select Fatima?

A My father and uncles attended QRC and were well known in the community, but I wanted to carve out my own path. At the time, Fatima didn't have the strongest football team, and no one from the school had ever won a national scholarship. That only fueled my determination. I wanted to be the one to change that narrative. I came close to winning a national scholarship, but life had a different plan—I earned the AMOCO Scholarship instead, and it opened a new path I could never have imagined.

Q Describe the culture of the school in your time.

A It was a great time. The school was still in its near infancy. In my days, Fatima was in the shadow of CIC (often viewed as our older brother). At that time, we were "young and hungry" for success academically and on the sports field.

Q Who was your favorite teacher and who was the scariest teacher?

A My favorite teacher was Mr. Camino who taught me Mathematics, and my scariest was Father Cochran!

Q Did you play any sports or take part in any extracurricular activities at Fatima?

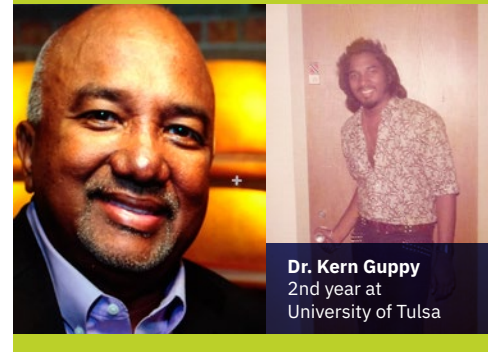
A No. I was not active in any formal sports, but I played football with my classmates after school.

Q Have you been able to maintain friendships with your classmates since school? Any class reunions?

A I keep in touch with some friends such as Brian Samaroo, David Soverall, Gerard Mahabir, Harold Imamshah.

Q What is the most valuable lesson that you learned at Fatima?

A The most valuable lesson I learned at Fatima was to never let anyone else define who you are or limit what you can achieve. I always dreamed of attending Stanford University, and Fatima taught me that with perseverance and by always reaching for the stars, anything is possible.



Q Tell us about your transition from Engineering to Medicine.

A I always had a deep interest in Medicine, but my natural strength in mathematics led me to pursue Engineering. Ironically, at Stanford, my thesis focused on "fluid flow dynamics in fractured wells"—a topic that later became invaluable when I began modeling "blood flow" dynamics. During my tenure as an Assistant Professor of Petroleum Engineering at the University of Southern California (USC), I collaborated with cardiologists to model blood flow in the carotid artery bifurcation. That experience rekindled my passion for Medicine, and with the encouragement of my medical colleagues, I decided to apply to medical school. As they say, the rest is history.

Q Are there times in your medical career when both fields have overlapped or merged?

A As my career progressed, I came to deeply appreciate how biomechanics and hemodynamics influenced everything I did in the operating room. Whether reconstructing the spine with rods and screws or performing complex scoliosis surgery, my understanding of biomechanics guides every decision—each curvature, level of fixation, and balance point. The same principles of hemodynamics applied when I performed arterial bypass surgery in the brain for diseased blood vessels. Today, the integration of biomechanics and hemodynamics has become central to how I think, plan, and operate each day.

Q With all the advances in medical technology over the years, is there anything on the horizon that is exciting or looks very promising for neurosurgery, in particular with regards to treating dementia or Alzheimer's disease?

A There is an exciting sub-specialty in neurosurgery called Functional Neurosurgery, where neurosurgeons target specific brain circuits that control movement, pain...

Living the Grey Shirt – Dr. Nicholas Fuller

(2024 Fatima College Hall of Achievement Inductee)

Dr. Nicholas (Nick) Fuller (Class of 1990 Form 5 & 1992 Form 6) is a distinguished leader in the field of Artificial Intelligence and Automation, currently serving as Vice-President of AI and Automation at IBM.

In this role, he oversees a global team, driving the global innovation agenda for agentic AI and next-generation automation, supporting IBM's multibillion-dollar automation software business and influencing emerging industry standards across IT operations, Industry 4.0, software engineering and business processes in the era of agentic AI.

With over 20 years of client-facing experience, Dr. Fuller has shaped enterprise-scale technology strategy, built high-performing global teams, and translated advanced research into market-defining outcomes.

An IBM Master Inventor, Dr. Fuller holds over 75 patents, has authored more than 80 technical publications, and has been cited over 3,800 times. As a thought leader, his insights frequently appear in prestigious outlets such as Forbes, The Deep View, TechRadar and international media.

Dr. Fuller earned a Bachelor of Science in Physics and Mathematics from Morehouse College and a Ph.D. in Applied Physics from Columbia University. Beyond his professional achievements, he is the author of "Struggle and Progress", and enjoys football, music, travel, and writing. He resides in Long Island, New York, with his wife and two sons.

Dr. Fuller's exceptional contributions to AI and automation, along with his dedication to innovation and thought leadership, made him a worthy inductee into the Fatima College Hall of Achievement in 2024.

Q Why did you select Fatima?

A Interesting question. So I wasn't able "to select Fatima" truth be told, as I was placed in Tranquility Secondary after sitting the Common Entrance Examination. My mother was visibly upset; I can recall her reaction to this day. As a 10-year-old I wasn't sure what to think, but given the relationship I had with my mother I requested to attend Tranquil' as I didn't want to retake the Common Entrance Exam, and she agreed. After doing very well academically in Tranquil', and through the influence of my sister (Nicole Woods) and one of my Primary School (St Gabriel's) teachers, they both persuaded my mom (and myself) to seek a transfer to Fatima which panned

out for the beginning of 3rd Form. And so in September 1987, I became a "Fatima" student.

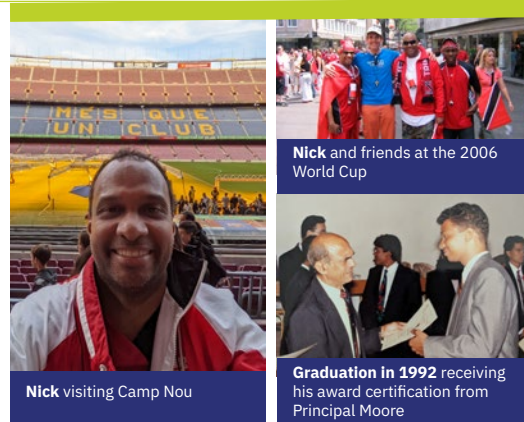
Q Tell us of your time at Fatima....pleasant and/or non-pleasant? Strangest memories?

A Was culture shock initially! Growing up in Barataria I wasn't exposed to the dynamism contained within Trinidad and Tobago's very wide socio/economic spectrum. Eventually I found my niche with a variety of friends, including my future Morehouse College roommate Damani Piggott, Pedro Gonzalez, Shane Kissoon, Dewan Andrews and many others. Honestly, I felt very overwhelmed with the prospects of being able to achieve academically and hold my own. I doubted myself deeply, and set about a study routine that was probably overkill in hindsight but it paved the way for various academic successes. I loved football dearly, but after playing at the U16 level, I skipped out on the opportunity to play "1st Eleven"—again, that was because of doubts I had regarding what I needed to do to succeed academically, and I didn't want anything or anyone to stand in my way.

I was also a member of the Fatima Debate Team, with Gareth Jenkins. Though that was for just one year, I have fond memories of that experience. As I gained more confidence in my ability to succeed academically, towards the end of 5th Form and in 6th Form, I was beginning to become much more introspective about many things including: the absence of my biological father from my life, the self-induced pressure of originating from humble beginnings, and the stigma of some of the ills of my extended family.

Q Who was your favourite teacher and to which teacher did you give the most trouble?

A I had quite a few favorite teachers—tough to separate Mr. Francis John and Mr. Francisco Garcia who respectively taught me Chemistry and Physics. Mr. Achille and Mr. Mahabir, who both taught me Math and Further Math respectively, were not far behind. They all really stimulated me academically,



and thoroughly helped to nurture my scientific and mathematical curiosities, in no short way contributing to the directions I undertook subsequently. Not sure I gave any teacher trouble in the typical sense...I might have challenged some stereotypes of what makes a successful student.

Q Did you play any sports or take part in any extracurricular activities at Fatima?

A Yes, as said before football primarily, though I stopped playing for Fatima at the end of 4th Form but continued to play recreationally. I loved the "engine room" when it comes to football, i.e. midfield (not surprising given my personality!)

Q Have you been able to maintain friendships with your classmates since leaving school? Any class reunions?

A Many friendships. We have a class WhatsApp group which is fun. My closest Fatima friends to this day are Damani Piggott, Dewan Andrews, Pedro Gonzalez, Ronald Williams...to mention a few. Pedro and I just connected when he visited New York recently, and I typically see Damani on a more personal level.

Q How would you advise a young student at Fatima thinking about a future in the tech industry?

A The world of tech is much faster and even more dynamic than when I was in high school, and it demands an insatiable "hands on" curiosity for the broader technology spectrum. While there are of course specialists in multiple domains, my instincts tell me that the individual who is likely to succeed is the one who is at a minimum: insatiably curious, wants to understand the broader ecosystem while starting and diving deeply into a given domain, is open to learning additional domains, and lastly, is very adaptable to change as that now occurs at a blistering pace.

DEBATE

Several senior members of the Fatima Debate Team participated in the Youth for Change School Debate Tournament. Seven schools competed in the elimination rounds, culminating in the finals on November 22nd. The debate team was represented by speakers Hagan Alexander, T'Kell James, and William Hadeed, whose outstanding performances secured a 1st place finish for Fatima College

Three members of the Fatima Debate Team, Kennedy Valley, Adam Alves and David Scotland, competed in the 2026 International Reparation Debate Competition, hosted by The University of the West Indies Centre for Reparation Research (CRR) in Jamaica in April 2026.

36 schools from across the Caribbean and the United Kingdom participated in the debates over several weeks, and Fatima College advanced to the finals after winning the debate against a British team and competed against Jamaica's Clarendon College in the finals. The motion debated was "Whether the United Nations Declaration, recognising enslavement as the greatest crime against humanity, meaningfully advances the global reparation movement". Fatima successfully copped top place and also won the award for Best Team Collaboration. Kennedy Valley emerged as the Grand Final Best Debater and winner of the Director's Award for Best Engagement with Reparations Theory. While all three of our students were nominated for Most Outstanding Male Debater, Valley also won that prize.

ARM WRESTLING

Vincent Gosine (Form 5) and his brother Luke (past Fatima pupil) took the international stage on Saturday November 8, 2025 in Antigua as they competed at the Clash of the Caribbean: Antigua vs. Trinidad. Representing the Trini Arm Warriors Arm Wrestling Club, both athletes delivered a powerful showing for Trinidad and Tobago.

Hockey 1987-1988

Having retained all but one of the titles (that being the prestigious Intercol title) in outdoor tournaments in 1987, Fatima's Hockey team went out with a vengeance in the Indoor Competitions. The teams won all three Indoor Competitions, including the National Indoor Championships which we had lost to Woodbrook Secondary in 1986. Outstanding players were Leon Ramdeen and Bruce Tang Nian; both went on to represent Trinidad and Tobago in the Pan American Junior Hockey Tournament in April 1988. Ramdeen also had the honour of leading the National Team. Two players on Fatima's team trained with the National squad, but just failed to pass selection; these were Dean Nieves and Shiraz Ali.

The performance of the school team in the 1988 outdoor season showed that the team was really an inexperienced team with only four experienced players. We played unbeaten in the League, though drawing too many games. Four players, Captain Jose Salazar, Vice-captain Sean Power together with Dean Nieves and Shiraz Ali were selected on an Under-19 Colleges North team to play in a Zonal Competition which the North team won. Fatima, however, failed to win an outdoor title at both Under-19 and Under-15 levels with St. Mary's walking away with all.

In the 1989 outdoor season Fatima's Hockey Team again did not fare too well but we showed that we have talent. With the loss of a few groomed players, the team had to work hard. We had victories over Q.R.C. (1-0) and Malick (10-0), draws with South East (0-0) and St. Anthony's (1-1) and we lost to St. Mary's (0-2) in the League. The Saints went on to win all outdoor tournaments for yet another year. However, the North Intercol final showed that Fatima still had fight for an inexperienced team. Having lost to St. Mary's in the League earlier in the season and fresh from a convincing 9-0 victory over South East in the Intercol Series, we came out fighting.

The boys from Frederick Street scored as early as the fifth minute but Fatima rallied to score two goals in the space of a minute, only to allow Saints to equalise just before the interval. Again Fatima came out fighting and were rewarded with a well struck goal to go up 3-2. Time and time again the Fatima forwards threw away countless chances only to see Saints equalise because of poor defensive work by Fatima.

The match went into sudden death extra time in which whoever scored first would win the match. Fatima could have had it in the bag but we threw away at the crucial moment. All in all we had a reasonably fair season. Fatima's most outstanding player was Dean Nieves and he, with Captain Douglas D'Abadie and Vice-captain Shiraz Ali were selected to play for the Under-19 North Colleges Team in Zonal Competition which the North Team won for the third year in a row. The Under-15 team also did quite well in the 1989 outdoor season. They won the League and placed second in the Knockout Competition. ♦
